
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About Me:

Course Description

Explore galaxies far, far away (and our own) with this class examining feminist approaches to the *Star Wars* franchise and fandom. Join the debate on female representation in the extended universe, fandom backlash and toxicity, and production response. Analyze canon texts including films, cartoons, fiction, and games, and compare them to fan created texts. Finally, create your own work – through analytical writing and creative production.

Star Wars is an iconic American film franchise that has recently been revived with new texts including the sequel trilogy and stand-alone films. This intergenerational text has gone through major production changes with a transfer from Lucas Films to Disney (George Lucas to Kathleen Kennedy). These production changes have affected the fan community creating gendered factions, new fan texts, and debates.

The course is divided into four sections: Myth, Memory & Fairy Tale, Feminist Perspectives, Fandom & Fan Works, and Fan Activism. For each class session we will read one academic article

or chapter, watch/read a canon text and a fanon one. Bring your passion, opinions, and questions to our discussion-based classroom. Don't forget to bring your respect for each other!

We will have weekly Fandom Show & Tell where you will post a fan text related to that class's reading and a discussion question. Additionally, you will have three response papers over the course of the semester. Finally, you will be working on a final project that includes creative production and/or academic writing.

Course Goals

By the end of this course you should be able to...

- Identify underlying ideologies in Star Wars and fan works around the franchise, and various feminist and fan studies approaches
- Discuss larger issues of gender, the social contract, copyright, and activism in relation to Star Wars and larger culture
- Create multimedia critical fan works of your own that repair, reclaim, and recenter the text
- Think critically about the connections between fandom, popular memory, and feminist discourse in the media

Course Texts

Required readings are available on iCollege. You should also have access to *Star Wars* canon, including the feature films (Episodes I – VIII, *Rogue One*, and *Solo*). Other canon texts like *Forces of Destiny, Clone Wars*, and fan works like *The Phantom Cut* will be linked in iCollege.


Fandom Show & Tell

There are six creative assignments this semester, where we will learn new technical skills and practice storytelling, parody, criticism in the fannish tradition. For each assignment you will be provided detailed technical instructions, including tutorial videos. For larger projects we will have scheduled production time in class.

Use these assignments to flex your creative production muscles. Fan creative works and authorship is one of the many ways to practice technical and creative skills.

Response Papers

Alongside each creative project is a reflection assignment. This is a traditional writing assignment and you will be expected to use proper grammar, syntax, and structure. Each of these assignments (there are seven) will have specific prompts that you will need to respond to. Additionally, you will find it necessary to leverage course materials and potentially even outside research.

Final Project

There are two options for your final project, regardless of your choice an analysis of a *Star Wars* text, either canon or fanon, will be required. Additionally, both options require a progression of work, revision, and a presentation.

Creative Project

You may choose to create a fan production for your final project. This could be a fan activism campaign, a fan edit, a fan film, podcast/vlog, or even a video game that relates back to *Star Wars* and a social issue (gender, sexuality, race, class, political protest, environmentalism). Given the nature of creative projects and the breath of work, you may work in groups. However, if groups are used a peer evaluation will be completed by each member, and each member will complete their own individual short analysis that relates to the creative work and a *Star Wars* text of your choice (1000-1200 words).

Term Paper

If you opt to complete a term paper, you may choose any combination of *Star Wars* texts as objects for your analysis (canon and fanon). You must also include a social issue (gender, sexuality, race, class, political protest, environmentalism) as a theoretical framework for your analysis. Your final draft should be between 2000 and 2500 words excluding your bibliography and any images. It may be written in an informal style, but must include some form of citation as needed.
